RFT REBATE & EXEMPTION ENTITLEMENTS CHANGES



The 12 month review promised when the RFT was introduced is not yet complete but the Government has signaled four additional situations where a new rebate or exemption entitlement should occur. The first two changes identified and commenced on December 21, 2018 were diesel used for home heating by private individuals and electricity generation by non-commercial organizations. The other two are petrol and diesel used in road registered vehicles that are used exclusively or predominantly off road and where petrol and diesel are supplied inside a regional fuel tax scheme area but then distributed outside the regional fuel tax scheme area.

These rebates will be back dated to July 1, 2018. Over January and February 2019 the NZTA will gather the information and then they will explain when and how customers can claim the new entitlements. McFall Fuel will be providing information to answer any of the questions that NZTA has of us as a distributor but it is very important for customers in the four areas identified to keep up with the changes by going to NZTA for guidance.

The information is contained in the Land Transport Management (Regional Fuel Tax) Amendment Act 2018.

PIRONGIA BOXING DAY RACES
