

A COLLABORATIVE APPROACH TO TANK SAFETY

Over the past month a significant amount of discussion has occurred around tank and site safety in the fuel industry. This has largely been driven because of the serious injuries that have happened in a number of instances involving Tripod Tanks. In many ways it is indeed fortunate that a death has not occurred to a fuel delivery driver considering the poor condition these tanks are in. McFall Fuel have a checklist which deals with not only the safety of the tank but also the site being delivered to. For example some of the questions asked about tanks are about the way the legs are attached to the tank. Are they rusty or bent? Is the bracing straight and undamaged? Site obstructions on the way to the tank like overhanging trees or hedges that need pruning are common while the quality of the road or race to the tank may have been



impacted on by bad weather. The area surrounding the tank needs to be kept clear of any debris as a recent accident revealed where it was this that caused the serious head injuries.

Over the coming months the Sales, Drivers and Operations Teams' supported by Training & Safety will be using the checklists to ensure that all tank assets we deliver to meet the industry standards. "Our Team have a responsibility to help customers understand what the industry standards are but then it is up to the customer to make sure that their tank meets these along with the necessary site requirements," said Allan McFall. "Strong communication and collaboration can very quickly resolve most of the situations our fuel delivery drivers are faced with on a daily basis and we have taken the approach that we are here to help to make it as easy as possible. Safe fuel deliveries are essential."


GISBORNE YARD WELL UNDERWAY

Take time to go over your tank and see if it has signs of significant rust pitting leading to wet rust or has product weeping from welded seams.

Any dents or damage needs to be assessed extremely closely. It is important to note that tripod stands cannot be retrofitted. Also, make sure your farm has safe access for fuel delivery. This includes safe all-weather entry and access to your property. If you have bridges and the tanker will need to go over them to access the fuel storage, the bridges should be able to take the weight of a fully laden fuel tanker. Best access and
