

DRIVER FATIGUE IN THE SPOTLIGHT



The green brain is the movement brain. The front half of the blue brain is for executive decisions. You need both to drive! Recently, Training & Safety Manager, Mike Crandon and Driver Trainer Gavin Reed attended a Train the Trainer Toolbox Meeting to learn more about driving and the brain. "Driver fatigue really matters in a business like ours because as we know it affects everyone and of more note," said Mike "is that it contributes to over 40% of truck accidents. We do everything we can to manage this risk but need to be constantly aware that fatigue can creep up on people. Very few people know when they have fatigue or are really aware of their driving performance not being at its usual level. Fatigue may be the culmination of factors such as low quality or not enough sleep, poor diet, lack of hydration, underlying health issues, or possibly working too many hours."

As part of our nationwide push to reduce the road toll we all need to focus on our driving behaviour and a good place to start is eliminating as many distrac-

tions as possible before heading out on our road journeys. It all sounds very simple and yet the number of road accidents continues to climb. When at work the key is to have the vehicle tidied and ready to go plus what is required for hydration and food for the day along with those planned breaks in place. Of recent times we have been wise to plan the route for the day along with checking the weather and any possible road closures or changes to help minimize frustrations. Mobile phones have been a constant source of debate because they are like passengers often distracting. The hands free approach is used by many motorists as a solution but each day no matter where you travel you see drivers holding mobile phones either texting or listening with one hand on the wheel.

Research suggests that truckdriver fatigue is a contributing factor in 30 to 40 percent of all heavy truck accidents and further to this the majority occur within the first two hours of getting on the road with 11.2% in the first hour and 32.4% in the second hour. It is intriguing to learn if you have been awake for 17 hours you have the same impairment as a drunk driver with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.05.

People also travel from around the North Island to take advantage of the approach taken which sees a wide range of health

conditions such as injuries and mobility issues catered for from neurological to paediatric. "People were finding the cost of taxis to get the gym a little too much and so to make it easier on

them we decided to get a van fitted out with the capability to collect people with disabilities," said Casey Brady, Director & Personal Trainer. "It is also great to get people out and about for their mental health. We are running the van using volunteer drivers and we are looking for more volunteers to see the pick ups work well." Casey understands what it means to be able to join a programme to improve your health and well being following her motocross accident in 2017 which left her with a spinal chord injury. A qualified teacher, Casey's life goal is to walk again.
