


UNIQUE BUNKER IN NEW PLYMOUTH



McFall Fuel Marine & **Forestry Services Manager** Tonv **Davies** recently oversaw the fuelling of the Q7000 Offshore Capping Rig at Port Taranaki. The unusual looking vessel is 95 metres long, 36 metres wide, and is self propelled travelling at 10 knots. "We had to pump the fuel higher than the 25 metres to 38 metres," said Tony. "This meant ensuring that their hose met the specs required. We delivered 994,000 litres of fuel over 32 continuous hours and the Team managed this iust so well."

"The rig is here for two to three months to plug and abandon wells in the Tui

Field off the Taranaki coast," said Andy Sorensen, the Taranaki Business Development Manager. "It was certainly a very unique experience for us all and one that is history making for the Region."

CHANGING FACE OF NEW ZEALAND'S AGRICULTURE

Once upon a time there were jokes made about the ratio of sheep to people in New Zealand, however, for the first time since 1850 the ratio has dropped below five to one according



to the 2022 Agricultural Census. The latest figures also revealed a significant drop in dairy herd numbers while beef numbers have remained pretty much the same. In contrast the gold variety of kiwifruit being planted continue to grow exponentially. Not only are the farmed areas are shrinking because of urbanisation but also there is evidence that there are lower stocking rates and a move to diversification which sees farmers cropping, planting trees, and or moving into horticulture. Tourism opportunities are also becoming part of the mix for farms as well.

At this point in time what we do know is about half the area of New Zealand is taken up with farming, forestry, and housing and about 13% of our population live on farms. The other half is native land cover and mountains. Getting the balance right for the land we have and our approach to Primary Industries is the challenge for any change. There is no doubt that the there will be much to think about to remain financially viable in agriculture.

There are about 2,500 containers collected monthly and a small percentage have been reused 15 times. 1500 of these containers are refilled with chain and bar after being cleaned and less than a thousand go to recycling. The McFall Fuel Recycling & Reuse work is carried out in the Hocking Street yard in Mount Maunganui by the Lubricants Team.
