Andrew Spicer who led the development process for the new yard and office has done a fantastic job from the native planting through to the fit out and finishing touches. The Driving Team are delighted that they can now wash their trucks knowing that the environmental protection is in place and the security for the fleet is a real step up on the previous location. THE ENERGY DEBATE CONTINUES

Fossil fuels accounted for 82% of the primary energy used last year compared with 85% five years ago and this clearly reveals that despite all of the hype and chatter any changes will be incremental. It is also interesting to see that OPEC accounts for three quarters of the increased oil production and that oil prices reached the second highest level since 2015 at a time when the push for renewable energy has seen stronger momentum than any other fuel. China is the leader in solar and wind capacity growth while at the same time remaining one of the big consumers of diesel and petrol. Already there

are signals coming from the German automotive industry leaders that we need to get the balance right and are warning against an over-reliance on electric vehicles. BMW, Ford, and Toyota are all making statements that the choice in motive power will need to continue and that some of the deadlines being set are in reality unattainable. The energy debate continues in a world where there a few countries who control the raw materials for batteries and gas and this in itself makes hydrogen look more likely because it is the only raw material that can be sustainably produced and stored. It is quite apparent any change will take time.

THE BROWN MAMORATED STINK BUG IS A HIGH RISK PEST



The McFall Fuel Yard at 14 Hocking Street is a Transitional Facility for the purpose of decanting chain and bar oil imported from Australia. The bladder containing the oil is pumped from the truck that transports it from the Port of Tauranga into a 30,000 litre tank in the McFall Fuel Yard. The next step is it is pumped into the 20 litre containers for distribution to customers.

As a Transitional Facility the company is bound under the 1993 Biosecurity Act to undertake border control on behalf of the Ministry of Primary Industries. "Chain & Bar Operators Peter Laird & Andrew Daysh are charged with preventing the high and low risk biosecurity threats and are required to follow stringent

MPI guidelines for opening and reporting on the contents of these containers," said Lubricants Manager Adrian Triggs. "Additionally, there is a legal requirement for the Lubricant staff to identify and report other pests, seeds, foliage, and dry matter that may be present in our Chain Bar containers."

The highest risk to our agricultural sector is the Brown Marmorated Stink Bug (pictured), which is a native to Asia, and feeds on over 300 plant species and if introduced into New Zealand could decimate our fruit and vegetable industries. Producing the defensive chemicals or stink, this pest is a sucking insect that can destroy a rugby field sized tomato patch overnight. Therefore to look after our fruit and vegetable industries we need to be vigilant when it comes to this stink bug and report any findings immediately to MPI to ensure that it does not become established in New Zealand.
